We have very little biography of HANNAH Attached mentions that she was an outstanding Truth Teacher of her day MOORE KOHAUS. that she led the SCIENCE OF BEING Center. She received her training at the HIGHER THOUGHT CENTER in England which was called in America NEW THOUGHT. Mrs Kohaus authored these books: BETWEEN THE LINES FRUIT FROM THE TREE OF LIFE SCIENCE OF SCIENCES REMEDIES OF THE GREAT PHYSICIAN BLOSSOMING OF UNIVERSAL TRUTH From MABEL PURDY SOUL FRAGRANCE and others.

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#### SPIRITS IN REBELLION

were held in Hyde Park. In a closing service it was proposed that a fund of a thousand pounds be raised to give permanence to the British Congress. There is no indication as to whether anything was done toward raising the fund.

Among the persons mentioned as present and participating in the Congress were J. Macbeth Bain, author of *Brotherhood of Healing* and *Christ of the Healing Hand;* Mrs. Heard, president of the Higher Thought Center, and Miss Alice Callow, secretary; Mrs. Mary Gordon and Mrs. Hall Simpson of the London New Thought Center; F. L. Rawson and Mr. Hendry of the Healing Center; Mr. Aldridge of the Wolverton Higher Thought Center; Paul Tyner of the Edinburgh New Thought Center; Captain A. St. John, secretary of the Penal Reform League; Rev. Charles Gardner, chaplain of the Guild of Health; Inayat Kahn, a Sufi; and Harendranath Maitra, a Hindu.

In a letter to James Edgerton, President of INTA, written in 1928, Miss Alice Callow states that during the twelve years when the Higher Thought center was at Chemiston Gardens, a number of lecturers came from the United States to speak to the Higher Thought Center and later established centers of their own. Dr. and Mrs. James Porter Mills established the Higher Health Center and later the New Order of Meditation, carried on later by Miss Antonia Collette and Mrs. Lena Ashewelt; Mrs. Hannah More Kohaus of the Gestefeld School led the Science of Being Center; Mrs. Ursula Gestefeld started a center (not named in the letter) which continued for some years; Mrs. Emma Curtis Hopkins visited London, but did no public work. She did, however, give private lessons to many distinguished persons, and wrote part of her Higher Mysticism while in London. Dr. Julia Seton founded a center called the Church of the New Civilization, carried on later by Miss Muriel Brown; Dr. Orlando G. Miller conducted a center in the Old Bond Street Galleries; and there were others.

The most distinguished English teacher of the period, wrote Miss Callow, was Miss Adela Curtis, founder of the Guild of Science, which had a large following. She also founded a Com-

Hello Reverend First of all, happy New Year! Our employee records from years ago are by no means thorough and based what we have at hand, we do not have an employment record for Ms. Kohaus. It is not absolutely certain that she wrote "The Praver of Faith" and at one point there has been some controversy as to its authorship. However, in the book, The Story of Unity's Fifty Golden Years, she claims her authorship by saying to Myrtle Fillmore: "Am so pleased the children are being helped by the simple lines. (A reference to "The Prayer of Faith") She goes on: "It was the first output from my pen after being born into the Truth of Being". Biographical information in our Unity Archives on Ms. Kohaus is very limited. Our records show that she was trained at the Higher Thought Center in England, which was called New Thought in America. Also, she was a Truth Teacher, leading the Science of Being Center of the (Ursula) Gestefeld School in Chicago. Her books include: Between the Lines; Fruit from the Tree of Life; Remedies of the Great Physician; Blossoming of Universal Truth; and Soul Fragrance. That last book listed is one of poetry. Thusly, it is quite possible that "The Prayer of Faith" may be included in that work, perhaps with a different title! Our library does not possess a copy of Soul Fragrance (a beautiful title that). We hope this information satisfies your needs. Thank you for your interest in the Unity Archives. I am

on cards and has given them to the children of Seattle, and it has done wonders. She lets them pick out the verse they like best, and that pleases them. In a family of three children, every one took a different verse and made beautiful demonstrations. One little girl liked "unfailing, quick," and it helped her do things right away-"now." One little boy demonstrated over "fights" with one line. Another made his father stop whipping him with the line, "Patient, kind, and loving, too." Some healed themselves of fear of darkness, instantly, with the second couplet; some of timidity and bashfulness with the fourth one. She says the more she works with it the more marvelous it grows. So, my Wisdoms, use these little verses and they will always work like magic for the good.

First used to inspire children with a sense of the Father's never-failing presence, it is now known as The Prayer of Faith, a prayer loved and used by Truth students of all ages everywhere. Various persons have claimed its authorship, but Hannah More Kohaus is the name of the" woman who really wrote it, and she granted permission to Myrtle Fillmore to publish it in Wisdom. After that printing of it in January, 1914, almost every issue of Wee Wisdom has carried a reprint of the famous verses. It has also been used in the other Unity periodicals, and has been printed on cards and distributed by the hundreds of thousands by Silent Unity. Shortly after its initial appearance in Wisdom Hannah More Kohaus wrote the following message to Myrtle Fillmore, in which she gave Unity continued permission to use the verses in their work:

He who loved little children and bade them come unto Him is with you in your work for them. Thus are you truly blessed. With repeated thanks for the book, I am sincerely and gratefully yours, HANNAH MORE KOHAUS.

The fact that Myrtle Fillmore was a devoted mother and that her own three boys Lowell, Rickert, and Royal responded quickly to Truth, stimulated her interest in training young minds to grasp the Christ teaching and incorporate it into daily practice so that they might develop into adults with a native comprehension of the spiritual principles of life given by the Master. Mrs. Fillmore was sincerely convinced that children's minds are not too immature to appropriate and understand the divine nature of all being; indeed, on the contrary, "of such is the kingdom of heaven."

Wee Wisdom is Unity School's second oldest magazine, and the name chosen for it indicates its significance and purpose: "wee bits of wisdom for boys and girls." Already the early issues of Modern Thought had been carrying a department for children

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
